

THE HOLY GOSPEL

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. Glory to you, Lord Christ.

On the first day of the week, two of Jesus' disciples were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, but their eyes were kept from recognizing him. And he said to them, "What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?" They stood still, looking sad. Then one of them, whose name was Cleopas, answered him, "Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have taken place there in these days?" He asked them, "What things?" They replied, "The things about Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, and how our chief priests and leaders handed him over to be condemned to death and crucified him. But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things took place. Moreover, some women of our group astounded us. They were at the tomb early this morning, and when they did not find his body there, they came back and told us that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who said that he was alive. Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said; but they did not see him." Then he said to them, "Oh, how foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have declared! Was it not necessary that the Messiah should suffer these things about himself in all the scriptures.

As they came near the village to which they were going, he walked ahead as if he were going on. But they urged him strongly, saying, "Stay with us, because it is almost evening and the day is now nearly over." So he went in to stay with them. When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him; and he vanished from their sight. They said to each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?" That same hour they got up and returned to Jerusalem; and they found the eleven and their companions gathered together. They were saying, "The Lord has risen indeed, and he has appeared to Simon!" Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he had been made known to them in the breaking of the bread.





Recalling Christ's death and his descent among the dead, proclaiming his resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting his coming in glory; and offering to you, from the gifts you have given us, this bread and this cup, we praise you and we bless you.

Grant that all who share this bread and cup may become one body and one spirit, a living sacrifice in Christ, to the praise of your Name.



MUSIC NOTE

Healy Willan (1880-1968) is one of the most beloved Anglican composers from Canada, and we sing his service music from our hymnal regularly. His anthems are accessible, yet high in quality with excellent musical expression. His setting of "O sacred feast" responds to our gospel reading. The choir moves together throughout, with dynamic swells and harmonies that give the listener a sense of being "filled with grace." The Latin text of Olivier Messiaen's (1908-1992) "O sacred feast" is composed in his distinct harmonic language which creates a sense of solemnity. It pushes the choir to sing in a different realm of harmonic language that stems from the Romantic composers of the 20th century France. You will hear the composer creating a joyous celebration of communion that is reflective and thought-provoking.

ART NOTE

St. George and the Dragon (as seen on the cover) is a mosaic by an artist from Madaba, Jordan. Born in Cappadocia (modern day Turkey) in the 3rd century, it is believed that St. George was an officer in the Roman army and martyred in Lydda (modern day Israel). This mosaic illustrates the story of George riding into the ancient city of Silene on his white horse. After making the sign of the cross, he vanquished the dragon, saving the king's daughter seen in the background and converting the grateful citizens to Christianity. While the story of George slaying the dragon is largely myth, the imagery closely adheres to biblical symbolism, particularly Revelations 6:2: "I looked, and there was a white horse! Its rider had a bow; a crown was given to him, and he came out conquering and to conquer." Iconography of George frequently depicts the saint wearing a red cloak and/or crown of martyrdom as he sits atop his white steed conquering Satan in the biblical form of a dragon. This artwork, which hangs in the hallway outside the Nave sacristy, was presented to St. George's in honor of the Rev. Dr. and Mrs. Leigh Spruill by Holy Land Pilgrims in October 2018.


