MUSIC NOTE

Psalm 100, "O be joyful in the Lord," is a great message for us Christians in any time, and it brings more sense of celebration to today's services when our choirs and congregation kick-off the program year. The setting of *Jubilate Deo* by Sir William Walton (1902-1983) is a shining musical setting of this psalm, heightened by the uplifting music. The organ part begins the anthem with joyful rhythmic pattern. The choir, divided into two sections, then mimic the joyful music back and forth with each other. Our first communion anthem, *Tu es Petrus*, is a setting of our Gospel reading for today. The second, *Ubi caritas*, is an ideal combination of "old & new" as the ancient communion chant is expanded by composer Maurice Duruflé (1902-1986) with his own unique modern harmonic language and texture.
