#### A Note on the Use of Incense

"Another angel with a golden censer came and stood at the altar; he was given a great quantity of incense to offer with the prayers of all the saints on the golden altar that is before the throne. And the smoke of the incense, with the prayers of the saints, rose before God from the hand of the angel." Revelation 8:3-4

Incense has a long history in the Christian tradition. It was widely used in Judaism and other cultures of the ancient world as a means of sacrifice, purification, and veneration. Frankincense, or pure incense, was among the gifts brought by the magi to the young Christ child.

Incense comes from aromatic gums and spices which are burned to produce a fragrant smoke. It is used to symbolize prayer rising to God. In this service incense will be carried in the procession and used to cense the gospel book and the altar.




#### THE GREAT THANKSGIVING Eucharistic Prayer II

By whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Ghost all honor and glory be unto thee, O Father Almighty, world without end. **AMEN**.


And now, as our Savior Christ hath taught us, we are bold to say,


