MUSIC NOTE

Cecil Frances Alexander (1818-1895) is a name you may recognize if you love the Christmas hymn "Once in Royal David's City." This Irish composer is not only one of the most hailed female hymn writers, but she was also an advocate for children's liturgical music. She wrote series of hymns for children based on the Apostles' Creed, including our closing hymn "All things bright and beautiful," which is fitting for today's service celebrating St. George's Kindergarten. The beloved hymn tune, *Royal Oak*, was first paired with this text in early 1900s. Our communion anthem, *Ubi caritas* by contemporary composer Ola Gjeilo (b. 1978), is a great example of the beautiful marriage of an ancient text and new musical language. Though it does not use the same traditional religious chant for this text, this composition was directly inspired by chant. Flowing, text-centered, continuous music combined with warm harmonic language highlights the beauty of love and charity as we come to the God's table for Communion.

The building crew continues to work throughout the day and the voicing crew overnight to prepare for our organ dedication events.
