THE READING 1 Corinthians 9:16-23

If I proclaim the gospel, this gives me no ground for boasting, for an obligation is laid on me, and woe to me if I do not proclaim the gospel! For if I do this of my own will, I have a reward; but if not of my own will, I am entrusted with a commission. What then is my reward? Just this: that in my proclamation I may make the gospel free of charge, so as not to make full use of my rights in the gospel.

THE HOLY GOSPEL Mark 1:29-39

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

Glory to you, Lord Christ.

After Jesus and his disciples left the synagogue, they entered the house of Simon and Andrew, with James and John. Now Simon's mother-in-law was in bed with a fever, and they told him about her at once. He came and took her by the hand and lifted her up. Then the fever left her, and she began to serve them.





Risen Lord, be known to us in the breaking of the Bread.



MUSIC NOTE

The offertory anthem *O Saviour of the world* [Salvator Mundi] by Herbert Howells (1892-1983), the opening movement to his Requiem, is a powerful response to our Gospel reading. It is a strong plea filled with complex and gut-wrenching harmonies reflecting our need for Jesus as our Redeemer and life-giver. The music opens humbly, but quickly develops to a complex and emotional outcry. *Draw us in Spirit's Tether* by Jack. H Ossewaarde (1918-2004) is a beautifully crafted short anthem on a beloved text. Phrases of the text are linked with phrases of the musical lines, providing a strong sense of flow that invites us gently to communion. The beautiful melody is wrapped with warm harmonic language and is wonderfully intertwined to the text.
