



#### MUSIC NOTE

Richard Farrant (1530-1580) was an English composer of the Renaissance era. His music is great example of how during that time, texts were the priority when composing choral music. Today's offertory anthem, *Lord, for thy tender mercy's sake*, is a response to the Old Testament reading from today's lectionary, which tells of Jonah calling the people of Nineveh to repentance. During the Renaissance, music was either highly complex polyphonic music (meaning multiple lines performed simultaneously), or simpler homophonic music (all lines moving together like a hymn). Farrant finds a great balance of both styles, bringing hints of imitation in the choral parts without making it too highly decorated, while allows the text to be clearly communicated to listeners. The communion anthem, *O nata Lux* by Morten Laudrisen (b. 1943), shows a great contrast in how texts can be presented in different time periods. Here, the choir sings in a more modern style, with soft dissonances that connect to soaring lines to express the enormous impact of the Lord's light in the lives of Christians.
