THE READING 1 Corinthians 8:1-13

Now concerning food sacrificed to idols: we know that "all of us possess knowledge." Knowledge puffs up, but love builds up. Anyone who claims to know something does not yet have the necessary knowledge; but anyone who loves God is known by him.

Hence, as to the eating of food offered to idols, we know that "no idol in the world really exists," and that "there is no God but one." Indeed, even though there may be so-called gods in heaven or on earth—as in fact there are many gods and many lords—yet for us there is one God, the Father, from whom are all things and for whom we exist, and one Lord, Jesus Christ, through whom are all things and through whom we exist.

It is not everyone, however, who has this knowledge. Since some have become so accustomed to idols until now, they still think of the food they eat as food offered to an idol; and their conscience, being weak, is defiled. "Food will not bring us close to God." We are no worse off if we do not eat, and no better off if we do. But take care that this liberty of yours does not somehow become a stumbling block to the weak. For if others see you, who possess knowledge, eating in the temple of an idol, might they not, since their conscience is weak, be encouraged to the point of eating food sacrificed to idols? So by your knowledge those weak believers for whom Christ died are destroyed. But when you thus sin against members of your family, and wound their conscience when it is weak, you sin against Christ. Therefore, if food is a cause of their falling, I will never eat meat, so that I may not cause one of them to fall.





Risen Lord, be known to us in the breaking of the Bread.



MUSIC NOTE

The offertory anthem, *Beati quorum via* written by C.V.Stanford (1852-1924), is a response to Psalm 111, though the text comes from Psalm 119. Delicately written, the triplet rhythm rolls through the choir, where six sections of singers mimic each other. This composition is the most well-known anthem by the composer, a beautiful representation of a psalm being put to music. Our communion anthem, *Ubi caritas* by modern composer Ola Gjeilo (b. 1978), resonates strongly with today's New Testament reading from 1 Corinthians. This anthem is a great example of a marriage between a traditional text and a contemporary musical style. While not based completely on the ancient traditional *Ubi caritas* chant melody, Gjeilo strove to create a piece that evoked a chant-like style with continuously flowing, text-centered melodies combined with warm harmonic language. This anthem highlights the beauty of charity as we come to God's table for Communion.
