THE NICENE CREED

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

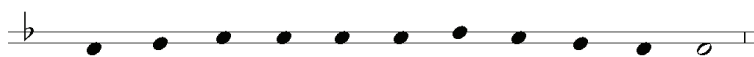

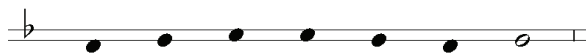

MUSIC NOTE

In *God so loved the world*, British composer Bob Chilcott (b. 1955) uses warm and soothing sounds to accompany the text which comes directly from today's gospel reading of one of the most beloved passages of Scripture, John 3:16. The music is hymn-like with a clear melody, embellished by a beautiful soprano solo descant, a musical embrace which illustrates God's love. *Verleih uns Frieden* [*Grant us peace*] is a great example of sung prayer. Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847) sets Martin Luther's text with beautifully warm and dignified music. Mendelssohn had a massive influence on the music of England and the development of Anglican music during his career. In this anthem, the lyric choral parts are matched with musical complexity and expression in the organ accompaniment.
