

THE READING 1 Corinthians 1:18-25

The message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written,

"I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart."

Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? THE HOLY GOSPEL John 2:13-22

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

The Passover of the Jews was near, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. In the temple he found people selling cattle, sheep, and doves, and the money changers seated at their tables. Making a whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables. He told those who were selling the doves, "Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a marketplace!" His disciples remembered that it was written, "Zeal for your house will consume me." The Jews then said to him, "What sign can you show us for doing this?" THE NICENE CREED BCP, p. 358





Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

MUSIC NOTE

Almighty and everlasting God uses the text from one of the many wonderful collects from our Anglican heritage. Orlando Gibbons (1583-1625) beautifully sets this text in the "Tudor style." Gibbons is very methodical, yet expressive, with the text. For example, listen for "Stretch forth thy right hand" where the choir swells up in volume and the texture of the music becomes more unified, expressing the might of God's hand. Ave verum corpus, a historic chant text used during the Eucharist since the 13th century, has inspired many composers through the centuries. Composers such as William Byrd (1543-1623) and Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart (1756-1791), as well as contemporary composers such as Philip Stopford (b. 1977), have used this text to express the solemnity of our beautiful Sacrament. Byrd's setting is a masterpiece in sacred choral genre and one of the most beloved Christian anthems that has been used to worship God for centuries. It's use of rhythm feels flexible and free, and the way he emphasizes the meaning of the Latin text shows the highest quality in craftmanship.
