



For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with George and all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

MUSIC NOTES

The anthems today display a variety of distinct styles though the text comes from the same source in the gospel reading. William Byrd (c.1540-1623) benefitted immensely from the favor of the Queen Elizabeth I. The Protestant queen appreciated Byrd's musical genius, and she spared him even though he remained devoted to his Catholic faith. *I will not leave you comfortless* shows his genius in contrapuntal writing, a polyphonic ("many voices") style of compostion. Each part sings intricate melodic lines at different times, but the individual lines still fit together and make sense with each other. Listen for the bell-like "Alleluia" repeated throughout the piece. Thomas Tallis (1505-1585) is a contemporary of Byrd. His music reflects the history of England, as he adapted to different musical demands during the different reigns of Henry VIII, King Edward VI, Queen Mary I, and Queen Elizabeth I. *If ye love me* by Tallis is a beloved anthem, simple in form but elegant in its melodic shape and simple contrapuntal writing. Philip Wilby's (b. 1949) modern setting of *If ye love me* is a completely different style, romantic in its writing, as well as lush and rich in its organ accompaniment.
