When Jesus entered the temple, the chief priests and the elders of the people came to him as he was teaching, and said, "By what authority are you doing these things, and who gave you this authority?" MUSIC NOTE

This morning, St. George's Choir is joined by St. Dunstan's Choir, comprised of students in Grades 1 and 2.

The composer of today's offertory and communion anthems, Edward Cuthbert Bairstow, served as the organist at York Minster from 1913 until his death in 1946 at the age of 71. A church musician through and through, he is perhaps best known for his choral anthems. Perhaps the most well-known of these works is his setting of the text "Let all mortal flesh keep silence." This text dates back to the 5th century and is taken from the *Liturgy of St. James*, which is still used by Orthodox churches today. Bairstow's musical setting illustrates the text well, beginning with only one musical line and culminating with fantastically rich seven-part harmony as the choir sings of the angels praising God with shouts of "Alleluia."
