

THE NICENE CREED BCP, p. 358





And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,



MUSIC NOTE

Today's offertory anthem, *Give almes of thy goods*, was composed by Christopher Tye (d. 1572). Composers from the Renaissance like Tye are commonly called "Tudor composers" after the reigning House of Tudor in England at that time. The musical language of this era strove to create music that is clear in text and subtle in expression. In this anthem of gratitude, the gentle lyrical lines bring out the text persuasively. The vocal parts mimic each other to create fluid continuous phrases typical of this period. *Love bade me welcome* is a beautiful text by poet and priest George Herbert (1593-1633). This beautiful welcoming text is set to music by contemporary American composer David Hurd (b. 1950), who taught sacred music for many years at the General Theological Seminary in New York. In addition to hymns, anthems, and service music, he is also well-known for his organ works, as well as his own skills of organ improvisation. He sets this text with a simple rhythmic pattern in which the whole choir sings together. The chords are warm and rich in tone, allowing for a wide dynamic contrast. It is a beautiful invitation to the table for our Communion meal.


