

THE HOLY GOSPEL

Matthew 22:34-46

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

Glory to you, Lord Christ.

When the Pharisees heard that Jesus had silenced the Sadducees, they gathered together, and one of them, a lawyer, asked him a question to test him. THE NICENE CREED BCP, p. 358







MUSIC NOTE

Our offertory anthem, *If ye love me*, reflects on Jesus' commandments in our gospel reading. Philip Wilby (b. 1949) is a British composer and choral conductor. He is known for his compositions for brass band, an ensemble which has a rich tradition in the UK and a warm tone quality. The organ part in today's anthem mimics that same timbre. The organ accompaniment is thick in texture, allowing the lyrical lines to soar easily with rich melodic lines throughout. *O how amiable* is a well-loved Anglican anthem by Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958), a leader and pioneer in the repertoire of Anglican music. This anthem is a response to today's Psalm 90, and it shares the same tune as our final hymn, "O God our help in ages past." It is filled with the composer's signature tunefulness, and it is swift and fluid throughout. The incorporation of hymns in larger anthems was a common practice of classic Anglican composers to highlight the richness of hymnody. This is modeled in today's anthem in which the sound builds throughout the piece, culminating in the hymn at the end.



Using a smartphone and headphones or a Bluetooth-enabled hearing device, you can tune into the service using AudioFetch. Connect to the Wi-Fi network called

AudioFetchExpress, then open the AudioFetch app to start listening.
