The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

As Jesus was setting out on a journey, a man ran up and knelt before him, and asked him, "Good Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus said to him, "Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone. You know the commandments: 'You shall not murder; You shall not commit adultery; You shall not steal; You shall not bear false witness; You shall not defraud; Honor your father and mother.'" He said to him, "Teacher, I have kept all these since my youth." **MUSIC NOTE** Highly influential in developing the identity of English music, Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958) was a prolific British composer. In addition to his original compositions, he is also well-known for his editing work on the English Hymnal (1906), which remains one of the most highly-regarded hymnals in the Anglican tradition. Vaughan Williams utilizes the hymn "O God, our help in ages past" (hymn 680) as the foundation of his anthem *O how amiable*. The beautifully lyrical lines introduced by the trebles build to a roaring organ part. The climax features the choir singing the hymn in unison, illustrating a sense of assurance and confidence in God. William Harris (1883-1973) also a prominent figure in the field of Anglican music, was lovingly known as "Doc H" by his choristers. *Behold, the tabernacle of God* is the most well-known anthem by Harris. Powerful harmonic progressions and soaring melodic lines lead to gentle and reverent ending on the word "Alleluia."
